

# Greenbelt Route as a cycling facility

- 84% Greenbelt Route provides a great cycling experience (40% strongly agree and 44% agree)
- 67% Greenbelt Route as well-marked (31% strongly agree; 36% agree)
- 75% feel safe on the Greenbelt Route (23% strongly agree; 52% agree)

# Greenbelt Route as cycling facility

- A few turns are missing signs and a few roads need to be resurfaced, but overall, a great ride.
- So hilly, but a welcome challenge and never boring! And the hard work of up hills is so often rewarded with spectacular views!
- Some roads and pathways need to be updated and fixed with cyclists in mind.
- Numerous very rough roads detracts from the pleasure of cycling this trail
- Some signage, particularly in the eastern end needs work. Not all turns are clearly marked from the perspective of a cyclist



### Return Visits to the Greenbelt Route

- 40% first time on the Great Waterfront Trail Adventure
- 100% enjoyed the Special edition GWTA-Greenbelt Launch (67% strongly agree and 33% agree)
- 59% discovered new towns and villages on the GWTA
- 64% will return to the Greenbelt Route within the next 24 months



### Other Cycling Trips

- 40% participated in 2 or more cycling events in Ontario in 2015
- 27% participated in 2 or more cycling events outside Ontario in 2015
- two or more overnight pleasure trips in Ontario in the past 2 yrs where cycling was a significant part of the trip.

# Survey Highlight Participant comments Other Cycling Trips

How I wish I was close enough to go there on a whim to enjoy again! It is BEAUTIFUL!

- Have already been back!
- We will definitely take our bikes when we drive up to the Greenbelt in the future
- I am not an avid cyclist so having the support of the GWTA was the only way I would have taken on this challenge ... in doing so, loved it!
- This route is quite challenging not really family friendly
- Need to be fit and trained to do the Greenbelt Route
- The material promoting the Greenbelt Route and GWTA2015 should have indicated that sections of the Greenbelt Route, especially travelling east to west, had challenging elevations.
- Some indication of the hilly countryside would be good to see on the webpage.

### Return Visits to the Greenbelt Route

- \$849 Average participant spending during the six days (\$142 daily) of the GWTA on transportation, food, accommodation, shopping, merchandise and other recreational activities)
- Ontario By Bike calculated the total economic impact of the GWTA Special edition as \$176K
- Generated 26 pieces of media coverage with a reach of 16,060,845 impressions.
