2022 Great Waterfront Trail Adventure

Celebrates the Simcoe County Expansion

Along the coastline of South Georgian Bay to the shores of Lake Simcoe in Simcoe County.

460 km (55 - 109km of riding per day). For the first time, the GWTA follows a loop route using connecting Trails, in this case developed by Simcoe County and the City of Barrie. Route links 25 beaches, 4 provincial parks, 1 national park, 10 heritage sites, a provincial wetland, 18 lakes, 1 heritage river, 25 parks, and numerous local businesses in communities along the shores of Georgian Bay and Lake Simcoe. It also incorporates two additional cycling loops—Thunder Beach and Big Chute.

4 Overnight Host Communities: Blue Mountain, Midland (2 nights), Orillia, Wasaga Beach

11 Community Rest Stops: Town of Blue Mountains (Blue Mountain Village Resort, Town of Meaford, Grey County Tourism, Simcoe County Tourism, Collingwood, Wasaga Beach, Penetanguishene, Midland Tourism, Township of Severn, Barrie, Springwater.




Celebrating 255 new signed kilometres with connections to 1023 km of great additional road cycling in Simcoe County. Adds two scenic loops: Thunder Beach and Big Chute. It connects wonderful local waterfront trails, including Tay Shore Trail, Tiny Trail, Penetanguishene's Rotary Trail, Uhtoff Trail, Barrie's Waterfront Heritage Trail, the Oro-Mendonte Rail Trail and Orillia's Greg Stobart Trail—all examples of how communities celebrate their waterfronts and heritage.

Highlights from the GWTA and Survey

- 89 responses; conducted August 13, 2022
- 23% first time on the GWTA



"It's [GWTA] very well organized and we're usually welcomed in a new place with red-carpet treatment."










Is this the first time you participated in the GWTA?

Did you visit communities for the first time on this tour?








Overall, how would you rate the GWTA as a summer holiday experience?

What people loved!

In an open-ended question, we asked what our participants enjoyed about the GWTA 2021. 74 people provided comments. Here is a selection of their thoughts.

The dinner and entertainment in Midland was my highlight of the tour. There was also a great deal of rail trail on this year's ride which I prefer riding, plus lots of roads with bike lanes or paved shoulders, or quieter roads like the Big Chute loop. These trails and roads made the riding enjoyable.

I loved how organized and seamless the overall experience was. The luggage service was perfect. The dinner in Midland was lovely - the venue, the entertainment (La Fontaine's very own Ariko), the hors d'oeuvres, the dinner, and the bus shuttle - all great.

GWTA is a nice group of people to ride with, very well organized with all the details thought through. Thank you for all the hard work putting this together and running it so well.

On this year's tour there was lots of support from the local tourism organizations and the local communities and politicians, plus CAA and the Greenbelt. Makes me feel very welcome.

Nice to have the options for shorter distances or different activities, although personally I'll went for all the cycling. GWTA also overnights in communities with good services like hotels and restaurants which are appreciated. The loop back to our start point was super convenient for me, always like to end at my vehicle. CAA dealing with the hotels was great.

GWTA vans were great as always. CAA booking hotels was very helpful. I took the maps and used them for an overview, but used RidewithGPS most of the time while riding. The route signage was great too. Itineraries are super helpful and something GWTA does better than any other tour I've ridden with, with recommended stops and restaurants. Mariposa in Orillia was a real find. Thanks for putting together a great tour again this year!

As always, the tour was impeccably organized and the support from the WRT team, volunteers, CAA and the local communities was fantastic. ... 

Suggested Improvements

In an open-ended question, we asked what respondents would suggest for improvements. 45 or 51% provided comments on the route.

- 49% of the 45 comments related to the trail surfaces, particularly sections with loose gravel or sand. Many suggested paving the route or suggesting a safe on-road alternative for road bikes.
- 36% called for more signage.

The loose gravel and sandy areas were problem spots using a road bike.

Some sandy patches, which were very hard to ride on. Also a few spots with 2 small parallel tracks with grass in between could've worked on to make single wide path

Watch the depth of sand and pea gravel used on trails.

Fresh loose gravel at the entrance and exit points along the rail trail is dangerous. Fortunately there was a paved road surface next to it, except it should have been signed as an alternative.

The Hill in downtown Penetanguishene leading up to intersection is dangerous, especially the intersection - there is a less dangerous option on Brook and Fox

The North Simcoe Rail Trail gates were difficult to navigate.

Road markings. Signs 6x6in are not helpful.

There are a few decision points that could be better signed.

Our group got lost a few times partly due to signage and partly due to inattentiveness. There are many different trail names, often without Waterfront Trail signs to designate the correct trail.

- WRT conducted a pre-tour survey regarding navigation Apps. Only 16% of respondents used a digital navigation App while 57% were interested in learning.
- In response, WRT and Ride with GPS hosted a webinar to introduce the App, demonstrate how to set it up and use it.
- 70% of post GWTA survey respondents used Ride with GPS an increase of 54% from the 16% who said they used the App pre-tour.
- 88% of survey respondents used printed maps which means that Ride with GPS is an important part of navigation but does not replace paper maps or route signage.

I took the maps and used them for an overview, but used RidewithGPS most of the time while riding. The route signage was great too.

I did not download the gps but feel that it really should have been mandatory for the trip.

Everyone else had RWGPS but I couldn't make it work on my phone (wish the GWTA could offer a person to assist someone like me who struggled the whole time to access the maps to use while riding. Far better would be RWGPS's Cue sheets.

I didn't download the Ride with GPS app, but the folks I was cycling with did use it and it turned out to be very helpful - there are a few turns without posted signs that I definitely would have missed without it. I would consider using it next year.

Accommodations

Answered: 88 Skipped: 1

For the first-time ever in the GWTA, more participants choose to stay in hotels than camp.

- 93% of people who stayed in hotels rated them as excellent (41%) or good (52%).
- 80% of respondents who camped rated campgrounds as excellent (11%) or good (69%).

Additional Hotel/Motel/B&B Nights pre- and post-GWTA

- GWTA supported luggage transfers to 8 hotels over the course of the ride.
- CAA booked 271 rooms for participants over the 5 days of the event.
- 38% of respondents extended their overnight stay beyond the dates of the GWTA, some adding as many as six additional nights.
- A total of 68 additional hotel nights were booked pre and post GWTA
- Respondents' spending on hotels during the GWTA breaks down as follows:
 - 32% spent between \$85 and \$299
 - 29% spent between \$300 and \$699
 - 39% spent between \$700 and \$1,600






Estimating the Economic Impacts that can be attributed to the 2022 GWTA

Answered: 82 Skipped: 7

- Participants were asked to estimate their GWTA-related expenses across several spending categories.
- Using averages per person per category we estimate expenditures of \$1,108 per person



CAA Sponsored Support

- 79% of participants are members of CAA or AAA
- 53% used CAA's Mobile Bike Assist Service to repair or adjust their bike.
- 20% used support vehicles during the ride
- 63% said availability of support important to their decision to participate
- 61% of survey respondents used CAA hotel booking service (others camped)
- 100% satisfaction with CAA Booking Service
